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## Summary:

- You can apply if your organisation is a:
  - o registered charity
  - o constituted voluntary or community group/organisation
  - o not-for-profit company or Community Interest Company
  - o statutory body such as a local authority, council or school.
- We don't accept applications from:
  - o individuals or sole traders
  - o organisations that don't have at least two trustees who aren't married/in a civil partnership/long-term relationship, living at the same address or related by blood.

### Awards for All

- Grants from £300 up to £20,000 for up to two years
- One-stage application process – apply at any time
- Can only hold one grant at a time and for a maximum of £20,000 within a 12-month period
- Prioritises groups with lower incomes
- Simple online application
- Funds projects that do at least one of these things:
  - o bring people together to build strong relationships in and across communities
  - o improve the places and spaces that matter to communities
  - o help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage
  - o support people, communities & organisations facing more demands/challenges due to cost-of-living

### Awards for All Environment Strand

- You can use the funding to:
  - o start a new activity or continue an existing one
  - o help your organisation adapt to new challenges
  - o run one-off events that have a clear environmental benefit
- We're looking to fund projects that:
  - o help people connect with and care for nature in their area
  - o make a positive difference to the environment

### Reaching Communities

- Grants over £20,000, running for up to 5 years
- Two-stage application process
- Can fund single organisations or collaborations/partnerships between multiple organisations
- Applications are online with other formats available
- Requests should be proportionate to the organisation's income
- Funds projects that support:
  - o places, people or communities experiencing poverty, disadvantage or discrimination (equity)
  - o people and communities to shape the decisions that affect their lives (agency) and;
  - o align strongly with at least one of our missions:

## Summary:

The Eveson Trust awards over 300 grants a year worth approximately £5 million to registered charities operating in Herefordshire, Worcestershire and the West Midlands. We support the work of hospices, and charities working with hospitals, people with disabilities, the elderly, the homeless and those supporting mental wellbeing.

We welcome new applicants, who can apply at any time as there are no deadlines. Applications are reviewed on a rolling basis, and it typically takes 4 months from application to decision. Previous applicants may apply one year after the date on their decision email if our grant has been fully spent and a grant report submitted.

If you want to apply for £50,000 or more, you must speak with our Chief Executive first to discuss your proposal. We will usually only consider capital applications over £10,000 from charities that we have funded on a regular basis. Capital projects from village halls or churches should benefit people with disabilities.

## Enhance Grants

Charities that have been previously funded by the Trust may apply for a grant of up to £10,000 towards the cost of training or consultancy advice to support one-off, capacity-building projects. You may apply for an Enhance grant while you currently hold a grant from us. National charities are not eligible for this scheme.

## What we don't fund

- We don't award multi-year grants.
- We don't fund voluntary associations, unregistered charities or CICs.
- We don't usually fund capital projects located outside our funding area.

## Application Process:

Having read the guidance on our website, applicants should go to Start Your Application.

We have a two-stage application process. Applicants who submit an eligible first-stage application will be sent the full application form, which must be completed and returned in 15 working days together with the supporting documents.

## Summary:

The Clive Richards Foundation was founded in 1986. Originally known as the Clive and Sylvia Richards Charity, this privately funded Charity has donated almost £18m to good causes both locally and overseas. After the death of Clive Richards in 2021 the Charity was renamed in his honour.

The focus of the Foundation is to support Education, Healthcare, Heritage, Arts and Overseas Education.

We aim to support those we fund in many ways to:

- Promote the longevity of projects
- Build good relationships with an appointed Trustee
- Assist new connections with relevant organisations
- Support the measurement of outcomes and impact
- Ensure best impact for finances invested

The geographic emphasis has historically been biased towards the West Midlands with Herefordshire being the most prominent recipient of donations.

## Application process:

Due to demands on the Foundation we have had to introduce geographical restrictions for applications. We currently restrict UK applications to within a 50-mile radius (as the crow flies) of our offices at Ullingswick, Herefordshire, HR1 3JF. For clarity both the applicant and the project being funded need to be within the 50-mile limit. Our preference is to support Capital projects where we are not the main funder (i.e. below 50%). We prefer not to support applications seeking funding for running costs or to pay salaries. UK applications are accepted at any time – you can request an application form via a link at our website [www.cliverichardsfoundation.com](http://www.cliverichardsfoundation.com)

We hold Stage 1 reviews every 4- 6 weeks depending upon the number of applications received. Stage 1 Trustees can approve Grants up to £5k.

If the amount requested is above this figure and it is approved at Stage 1, it goes to Stage 2 where additional information is requested and a face-to-face meeting is held with the Stage 2 Assessor, Tim Dutton. The application can be declined at this stage or Tim will present the application to the Board of Trustees for their consideration.

If the amount requested is more than £70,000 the applicant will be required to make a presentation to the Board.

The Board of Trustees meet bi-monthly.

Once an application has been determined, either positively or negatively the applicant cannot re-apply to the Foundation for a period of 12 months after the date of notification or being paid out, whichever is the latter. We are happy to discuss any potential requirements ahead of an application if required.

# The EF Bulmer Trust



## Summary:

Established in 2003 the EF Bulmer Trust supports former employees of HP Bulmer PLC. Any residue left beyond this is used to help residents in Herefordshire in hardship, need or distress. The Trustees meet three times a year to agree on grant awards. Applications are welcome from charities, CIC and constituted community groups. The Trust also has a small fund to support individuals with immediate needs - these grants are capped at £500 and will only be paid to professional agencies on their client's behalf. The Trust owns and operates the Fred Bulmer Centre in Wall St, Hereford. Home to 11 local good causes and providing good value meeting spaces, the centre is at the core of the Trust's contribution to the local community.

## Application Process:

Applicants must apply using the form on the Trust's website. New organisations are encouraged to talk to the Trust before applying. Applications are considered by the Board of Trustees within 10 weeks.

## Summary:

Herefordshire Community Foundation (HCF) has supported grassroots community projects across the County since it was established in 2002, distributing over £8 million in grants in this time. Our aim is to build stronger communities in Herefordshire.

There are 47 community foundations in the UK looking after every corner of the country. Covering every postcode, they build endowments and generate funds to support community needs and local organisations making a difference. Community foundations offer grant-making programmes funded by donations from individuals, families, businesses as well as grants from other bodies, such as the Government.

HCF gives grants to make a difference to the lives of vulnerable, isolated and disadvantaged people in Herefordshire. Our grants provide support for education and training; the environment, disabled, older and young people; relief of hardship; health and wellbeing; culture and community cohesion, along with other relevant current issues.

Individual grants for fuel poverty and white goods are usually awarded in the region of £250-£500. Grants to organisations tend to fall within the range of £3,000 - £5,000. However, we have given out grants for as little as £70 and as large as £20,000.

Organisations do not have to be a registered charity in order to apply, but must have charitable or social benefit aims. Priority is given to small, local organisations whose work benefits people in Herefordshire. Individuals seeking hardship grants can apply via a referral agency or supporting professional. We can also support students with bursaries.

## Application Process:

Please complete the main application form on the website for all funding applications, with the exception of the Fuel Poverty Fund and HCF Emergency Relief Fund which have their own application forms.

Once the application form has been submitted, our Grants Team will process the application. Please ensure you include all relevant supporting documentation with your application.

Some Funding Panels meet on a regular basis, others are held on a case by case basis. Grants approved by the Funding Panel are then ratified by the Trustees before being awarded.

## Summary:

This charity, established by the Will of Howard Bulmer (1898-1985) of Longmeadow, has no restrictions on the nature of the grants it may give but the trustees have indicated that they are only likely to make grants to charities based in Herefordshire. Their areas of focus align with Howard's personal interests which are Nature (rivers, birds, and natural history); Young people (wellbeing and education); and pomology & cider.

The trustees generally meet annually in summer to consider grants, although applications may be considered on an ad hoc basis.

## Summary:

Small grants (generally under £500) are available for museums and art galleries in Herefordshire, primarily to help with the acquisition of works of art or objects of historical importance to Herefordshire or their restoration and conservation, and for exhibitions. Grants are also available for organisations and individuals in Herefordshire involved with the Arts, especially where this is to enrich the public offer at museums and heritage sites, and occasionally for heritage professionals, artists and craftsmen embarking on their careers.

## Summary:

Using money raised by National Lottery players, we distribute grants from £10,000 to £10million to support projects across the UK that connect people and communities to the national, regional and local heritage of the UK.

National Lottery Heritage Grants is our funding programme for all types of heritage projects in the UK. Grants are available at two levels: £10,000 to £250,000 and £250,000 to £10million.

What is heritage? Things from our past that we value and want to pass on to future generations, including:

- people's stories and memories
- cultural traditions
- histories of people, communities, places, and events
- nature and habitats
- parks and historic gardens
- historic buildings, archaeological sites, and monuments
- objects, collections, and archives
- industrial, canals, maritime and transport heritage.

Who do we fund? Any not-for-profit organisation, including:

- charities and charitable incorporated organisations
- community and voluntary groups
- parish councils
- community interest companies
- faith-based or church organisations
- local authorities
- other public sector organisations.

Private owners of a heritage asset can apply for up to £250,000, but their project must demonstrate how public benefit outweighs any private gain.

Our Investment Principles - the National Lottery Heritage Grants programme is underpinned by our four investment principles, which guides all our grant decision-making under our new 10-year strategy, Heritage 2033. They are:

- saving heritage
- protecting the environment
- inclusion, access and participation
- organisational sustainability.

Applicants must take all four investment principles into account in their application. The strength of focus and emphasis on each principle is for the applicant to decide and demonstrate.

# The Roger & Douglas Turner Charitable Trust



## Summary:

### History and origins

The Trust can be traced back to when local industrialists and philanthropists Mr Douglas Turner and his son Mr Roger Turner set up separate grant-giving charitable trusts in 1964 and 1971 respectively under the direction of common independent trustees. Both The Douglas Turner Trust and The RD Turner Charitable Trust are now dormant. In 2013 the Trustees took advantage of changes in charity law to set up a new Charitable Incorporated Organisation now called The Roger & Douglas Turner Charitable Trust (“The Turner Trust”) which merged with the two former trusts and now controls all the activities.

### Principal aim

Our principal aim is to make grants to registered charities mainly based in Birmingham, the 4 boroughs of the Black Country (Dudley, Sandwell, Walsall & Wolverhampton), Worcestershire and Herefordshire, focusing on those which provide support in the following 6 thematic areas; Adults in need; Young people in need, Hospices, Mental health support, Poverty; and Environment & Heritage.

Appeals are not generally accepted from areas outside those described above. However, appeals may be considered from national or regional charities that can demonstrate specific charitable works and public benefit in these areas. During 2025 we awarded 183 grants totalling £964k, an average of £5,268.

### Secondary aim

Our secondary aim is to maintain the Arley Estate for public benefit by providing access for recreation and education at Arley Arboretum and Gardens. This is a unique, historic and tranquil estate in the heart of Worcestershire. See our website [www.arleyestate.co.uk](http://www.arleyestate.co.uk).

## Summary:

We aim to support a diverse range of projects with a focus on smaller organisations where a small amount of funding can make a considerable difference, and applications from new organisations, or groups that have not applied to us previously. The committee meets 4-5 times per annum to consider applications. We welcome applications from any group in the not-for-profit sector – we do not support individual or private sector organisations. Applications are welcomed for projects of up to £3,000. We will accept applications between £3-5,000, but these must show additional merit. Council on occasion will invite applications of between £5,001 - £10,000, but only by invitation and at our discretion. These will also require approval from full Council. Projects must be predominantly for the benefit and enrichment of the population of the City of Hereford.

We also run a grants programme for Climate and Biodiversity projects, with similar guidance to Community Development applications, with an emphasis on carbon footprint reduction and/or diversity and habitat restoration

We do not fund:

- Salaries
- Management or 'Back Office' Costs
- Contingency Funding
- Retrospective Spend
- Political or Faith Based Projects
- Projects that support, but are not additional to, the National Curriculum

## Application Process:

Please read the Policy notes and guidance at the beginning of the form before beginning your application. All applications must be submitted a minimum of three weeks before the relevant panel meeting (dates are available from the External Funding and Community Support Officer) with relevant supporting information, namely

- Constitutional / Governing Document
- Latest Audited Accounts
- Recent Bank Statement

Applicants are free to contact the External Funding / Community Support Officer for advice on and help with their application. Letters will be sent out following the relevant committee meeting advising applicants of the panel's decision.

On completion of the project, a Project Completion Report needs to be submitted within three months of project end. Failure to do so will result in ineligibility for future funding rounds.

## Eligibility:

The charity works hard to support those in greatest need of financial and educational assistance.

### Grants support:

- Children and young people aged 3 - 19 (or those aged up to age 25 with a Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan)
- Who are in financial need
- Are attending school or college in Herefordshire.

## Types of applications:

- Awards to individuals (not ordinarily more than £500)
- Grants to organisations (not ordinarily more than £1000)

### Examples of what we might consider funding:

- Fieldwork and local environmental projects
- Visits to art galleries, theatre, exhibitions, places of historical/architectural interest, cultural or foreign language exchanges
- Equipment for after school clubs, based on academic curriculum
- Purchase of fieldwork equipment
- Facilitation of educational experiences
